# Become a co-op voter!

When was the last time you voted? As a member-owned electric

cooperative, voting is already in our DNA. It's how we maintain an electric utility that's responsive to the people we serve. But voting also plays a crucial part in our representative democracy. Federal, state and local elections offer an opportunity to exercise our civic responsibility to select the best leaders for our communities.

Yet in places all over America – even those served by electric cooperatives – citizens aren't exercising that right. In the 2012 national elections, voter turnout dropped overall, but the decline in rural counties was 18 percent – twice that of the nation as a whole. When you miss the chance to vote, you also lose the opportunity to communicate your concerns to our leaders about the issues that matter to us, where we work, live and raise families.

Reliable electricity, CO-OPS ర access to rural PROGRAM broadband and the quality of our health care system are just a few issues we all care about. Still, they only become priorities if enough people show elected officials that they're paying attention. Registering to vote and voting are the most effective ways to send this message.

When we go to the polls with the cooperative principle of "Concern for Community" in mind, we instantly improve our political system. It's a system designed to produce a government "of the people, by the people and for the people" – people like you and me.

I'd like you to join me in a new initiative to get every eligible person registered to vote – you, your family and friends – and take the pledge to become a co-op voter. Access Energy Cooperative has joined America's electric cooperatives in launching a campaign to help get out the vote



and insert issues important to co-ops into the public discussion. Called "Co-ops Vote," this effort will help boost voter turnout in areas served by cooperatives across the country to ensure that our voices are heard loud and clear every day – and especially on Election Day.

Here's what you can do to help. Visit the Co-ops Vote website at www.vote.coop and take the pledge to support your community and electric cooperative when casting your vote in 2016. The website will give you information on your elected officials and candidates, the voter registration process, election dates and locations, and background about eight key co-op issues we want our elected leaders to understand: rural broadband

access, hiring and honoring veterans, low-income energy assistance,

> cybersecurity, water regulation, rural health care access, affordable and reliable energy, and renewable energy.

Co-ops Vote is a nonpartisan program developed by the National

Rural Electric Cooperative Association, the national service organization that represents the nation's more than 900 private, not-for-profit, consumer-owned electric cooperatives. With 42 million members across the nation, electric coops are a powerful voice on national issues that have a local impact.




# Dividends are coming soon

Once a satisfactory level of margins or profits for 2015 was determined by the Access Energy Cooperative Board of Directors, the cooperative assigned the rest of the margins to you, the members – each of whom owns a portion of the cooperative – according to the amount of energy purchases you made in 2015.

Each member has a dividend account at the cooperative where your dividend allocations accumulate. When the Board allocated the 2015 margins, your portion was moved to your dividend account. Notices were mailed May 18 with the amount that was allocated to your account.

This year, Access Energy Cooperative allocated \$1,254,258 and passed through allocations from NE Power of \$567,342 – for a total allocation of \$1,821,600. The amount of total allocations the cooperative has stored in the dividend accounts was then reviewed by the Board to determine whether or not to generate a dividend payment this year. After reviewing the cooperative's current financial position, the Board approved a dividend refund this year in the amount of \$969,670. This refund is 100 percent of the remaining dividends for 1996, 29 percent of 1999, 61 percent of 2000 and 13 percent of 2015.

Dividend checks will be available to pick up at the annual meeting on Aug. 2. Any checks not picked up will be mailed after the annual meeting to the most current address we have on file. The cooperative will not be printing checks for amounts under \$5; these amounts will be added to next year's refund. *f*
