Youth Tour winners selected for trip to Washington, D.C.

Meghan Ryan of West Burlington and Lucas Lee of Mount Pleasant have been selected to attend the 2017 Youth Tour on June 9-15. The event is an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., sponsored by Access Energy Cooperative.

Meghan and Lucas will join 38 other Iowa students and more than 1,700 students from across the country who have been selected by their electric cooperatives to attend the annual Youth Tour.

A junior at West Burlington High School, Meghan is the daughter of Amy and Shaun Ryan. She's been active in basketball, dance team, show choir and jazz band.

Lucas is a sophomore at Mount Pleasant Community High School and is the son of Meredith and Benny Lee. He's been involved in symphonic,

marching and jazz bands; chamber and show choir; school plays; musicals; football; trap; and soccer. Lucas is also a member of the Silver Cord volunteer program, Boy Scouts, Scouting's National Honor Society – the Order of the Arrow, 4-H, Midwest Old Threshers, Southeast Iowa Soccer Officials Association, the Community Band, Opus Honor Choir, the Iowa State Fair's Little Hands on the Farm and his church.

While on tour, Meghan and Lucas will learn about American history and government. They'll visit historical sights including monuments, museums, the U.S. Capitol, federal agencies and other points of interest – plus have an opportunity to meet with their legislators in the House and Senate.

Access Energy Cooperative has been a part of the Youth Tour program for more than 50 years and currently selects two students each year to participate in the 5-day trip. The students are chosen through an application and interview process. ⚡

Access Energy Cooperative visits the Iowa State Capitol

There's a saying in the cooperative world that "we were born in politics, and we will die in politics." President Franklin Delano Roosevelt passed the Rural Electrification Act of 1936 that provided federal loans for the installation of electrical distribution systems to serve isolated rural areas of the United States. From the inception of Southeast Iowa Cooperative Electric Association in 1938, to a name change in the year 2000 to Access Energy Cooperative, your co-op remains very active on the political scene to make sure the cooperative's interests are conveyed to legislators on the federal, state and local levels.

To this day, the staff and board of



directors maintain relationships with our local legislators. We visit with them frequently to make sure they understand the cooperative business model. Rest assured that local legislators are working on your behalf.

Every year, we spend a few days at the Iowa State Capitol discussing issues concerning the cooperative with legislators. In March, electric cooperatives throughout the state converge on the Capitol for REC Day on the Hill. The cooperatives take over the rotunda to set up displays, ranging from safety to energy efficiency, for the legislators.

In addition to REC Day on the Hill, your board spends another day visiting with legislators about topics

pertinent to the cooperative. Our goal is to make sure they can make informed decisions on issues affecting the cooperative. Our contacts are not only personal visits at the Capitol, but also include e-mails and phone calls with questions that might arise.

Whether you like politics or not, we're involved because of need. We make sure that the interests of Access Energy Cooperative's members are in the forefront when we visit with legislators. Even if we don't have issues directly affecting the cooperative, we still maintain the relationships. Sometimes, when they face contentious issues, we're a friendly face to them. ⚡

HOW YOUR CO-OP WORKS

Do you know the advantages of being a member of an electric cooperative?



Our mission is simple

Electric co-ops were established to provide at-cost electric service. Providing safe, reliable, environmentally responsible and affordable power has remained our mission since day one.

We're guided by a set of principles

All co-ops operate according to the same set of Seven Cooperative Principles: voluntary and open membership; democratic member control; members' economic participation; autonomy and independence; education, training and information; cooperation among cooperatives; and concern for community. These principles guide every decision made by the co-op.

We're not-for-profit

Unlike investor-owned utilities, which are operated to make the greatest profits for stakeholders, electric co-ops don't earn profits. Instead, after all expenses have been paid, any margins or revenue remaining are returned to members in the form of capital credits. Capital credit returns are based on each member's years of participation in the co-op.

We're a local, community-focused business

Because we're owned by the members we serve, electric cooperatives have a strong commitment to our local communities. In addition to providing safe, reliable and affordable power, electric co-ops are involved in local community development programs and projects, Youth Tour and other youth engagement programs.

We're committed to innovation

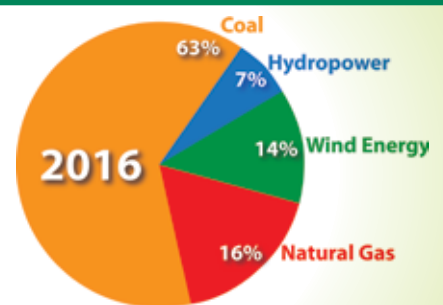
Because we answer to local members rather than far-away shareholders, electric cooperatives are more nimble and able to respond quickly to changing member needs. We're committed to experimenting and innovating in ways that benefit the local communities and members we serve.

You're a member, not a customer

Cooperatives are unique businesses because they're owned by you, the member. This means you have a voice in the way we run the co-op. Members elect the co-op's board of directors and have the ability to run for a seat on the board if they wish to do so. Your vote and participation help shape the direction of the cooperative. ⚡

ABCs OF ELECTRICITY

Your power comes from a diverse mix of fuels



Having a diverse power supply is important for providing reliable electricity. Our power supply includes a mix of renewable energy resources such as wind and hydro, as well as economical and efficient baseload sources like coal and gas. When generation output from a solar array or wind turbine doesn't coincide with the demand for resources to meet our members' peak load, it's important to have our baseload resources ready to provide your power. ⚡

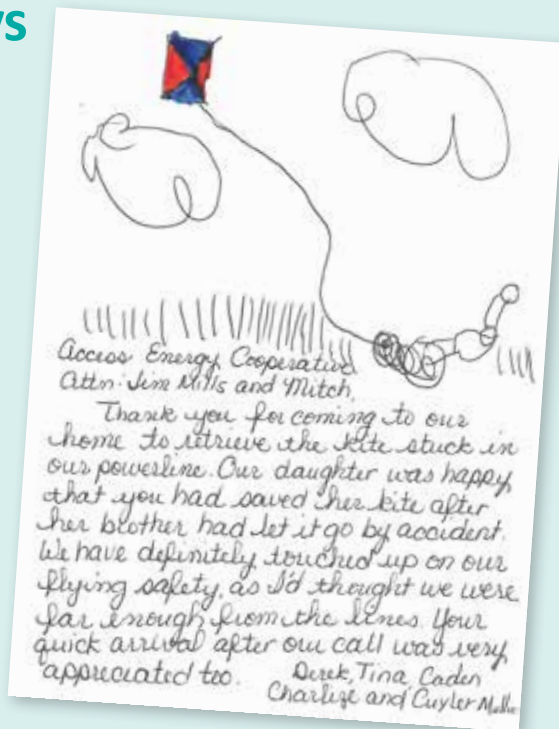
