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

The value of electricity continues to shine

How many of us remember dropping into Access Energy Cooperative's office with our parents

or grandparents to pay the "light" bill? Whether you do that in person, by mail or online today, paying your monthly bill does a lot more than just keep the lights on.

Electricity keeps us connected to our modern world. Consider all the necessities and

conveniences we enjoy, in part because of the power lines running to the electric meter outside your home.

Count up your televisions, desktop computers, laptops, tablets, printers, gaming consoles, music and video players, and personal assistant devices. Whether they get used every day or just occasionally, the electricity that keeps these devices working comes from Access Energy Cooperative.

Have you looked around your kitchen lately? Between the coffeemaker and toaster and microwave and electric skillet, a lot of us have added several modern small appliances.

If you have a craft nook or workshop, the power tools and machines you use to cut and shape your projects are either plugged in or recharged from the outlets connecting your household wiring to Access Energy Cooperative. You use electricity to run all these devices – and we still keep the lights on, while you use the stove, heating

> and air-conditioning, and get hot water from the tap. The good news is that even as we rely more on electricity, it's still a bargain – especially compared to other things we pay for regularly.

> Since 2011, expenses for medical care, residential

rentals and education have increased at rates of 3 percent or more per year. Butter, meat and egg costs have been up by more than 1 to 2 percent annually, and even bread prices have risen better than a half percent on average.

Electricity costs rise about 1 percent a year, but co-ops across the country have reported a decline in average residential use per household since 2010. That means we're doing more things with less energy.

Kilowatt-hour use per household dropped by 8 percent between 2010 and 2016, slightly less than the 9 percent decline reported by all electric utilities nationwide.

When it comes to value, electricity is a clear winner, and we're always looking for ways to work with you to make it even better. That's why Access Energy Cooperative urges energy efficiency, encourages you to look for ENERGY STAR® appliances and promotes technology designed to give members more control over their electricity use. Members have 24/7 access to the information on their accounts with the **SmartHub** technology that's available both on our website and as an app for your mobile devices.

Energy performance dashboards, smart thermostats and power strips, and appliance settings that shift most water heating, laundry and dishwashing outside of peak rate periods help reduce the co-op's overall power demand. They also give you opportunities to control or even trim your monthly utility bills.

That's good for families, couples and individuals trying to live within their budgets. And it's going to become even more important as digital devices and Internetconnected technologies become a greater part of our lives.

The average home has 10 Wi-Fi connected devices now. That number is expected to explode to 50 by 2020. Technology and the gateways that keep it working use electricity, so you'll depend upon Access Energy Cooperative for more than just the power that keeps the lights on.

That's why we're always working to provide service that's reliable, affordable and even more valuable to our members – you, your family and your neighbors. *≸*

Keeping up with technology keeps your power on


It's a simple premise: When you flip the switch at home, the lights should come on. At Access Energy Cooperative, we work hard to ensure you have electricity every hour of every day. It's what we do; we're here for you, our member-owners. Even as we upgrade the distribution system to improve reliability, we face continual threats, such as a tornado or ice storm. Maybe a neighbor forgot to call before he dug up his backyard. Maybe someone slid off the road and hit a utility pole.

With more than 2,200 miles of electric distribution lines, we have a lot of ground to cover. So when the lights go out, we cover it as quickly as possible. Not too long ago, our only option was linemen driving throughout large areas to investigate a problem. But we've invested in smart technologies that allow us to monitor our system remotely and pinpoint problems more quickly and accurately, as they occur.

We also have great employees with tremendous expertise in maintaining and repairing our infrastructure. As your locally owned and operated notfor-profit utility, we deeply care about the areas we serve. We evaluate and deploy cost-effective system upgrades and preventive maintenance strategies across our 10 counties. And we work hard all year to keep trees away from power lines to prevent outages.

For 2017, our outage reports show

a slight increase in the number and length of outages incurred by our members, mostly due to weather. There were no major storms last year, which helped tremendously; our stringent equipment and vegetation management plans are doing their job to keep outages down and your power reliable.

Our 2017 reports continued to show an increase in the number of poles rejected during safety inspections over the last 5-year average. We have been employing a new technology for the testing process, which is helping strengthen our pole-testing program – and create a safer system for you.


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


